Lieutenant Colonel Chris Molino is a retired Army officer whose 20 year career included operational and senior staff assignments focused on counterterrorism and U.S. policymaking. In addition to conventional assignments in the Infantry, Colonel Molino was selected for service in both Army and Joint Special Operations commands at every rank from Second Lieutenant to Lieutenant Colonel. Colonel Molino's combat experience includes command and leadership roles in Iraq, Syria, and Afghanistan.
